But now just such an opportunity is about to land in our laps! A new film is coming out which will get everyone talking.


On March 18th 'Risen' will be released. It is a compelling, professionally produced film about Jesus' resurrection, which takes a fresh approach while remaining true to the biblical story. The story is told through the eyes of Clavius, a sceptical Roman soldier, who is tasked by Pontius Pilate to investigate Jesus' death and resurrection, in order to debunk the claim that Jesus is the Son of God. In the movie we see Clavius turn from someone who is hardened and remote to someone who shows mercy and believes. Towards the end there's a moving scene where Jesus affirms what Clavius seeks - certainty, a day without death and peace, all found in following Jesus. 'Risen' is on at all major cinemas – including Didsbury. Lets use this easy opportunity to get our unbelieving friends talking – invite as many as possible to come and see it with you (even if it means going several times yourself !!), and why not give them a copy of 'Easter Uncut' (see review on page 5) as a take home gift, to look at the eye witness record themselves.

Gareth: Hi Anne and Richard, many of us know you, given you've been a part of St. John's nearly 20 years now! but for those of us that don't know you tell us a bit about your background.

Richard: I'm an Engineer by training and I started out working life in North Sea oil exploration and in the mid-1980s I was looking for a base near Heathrow so I could fly out to Norway easily and so I looked into renting a room in Oxford and ended up being flat mates with Anne!

Anne: I told my mum that our new flat mate was nice because he wasn't there very much! But when he left at the end of the year we started seeing each other and were married a few years later in 1990. We moved to Cheltenham the next year and Henry, our eldest was born the year after that. By the time we moved to Wilmslow in 1998, we had George, Ellie and Alice in tow too!

Gareth: And you both became Christians in Cheltenham?

Anne: Yes, we both come from Christian families but had drifted away in our teen years and then in Cheltenham we got to know a couple who had been medical missionaries and who had a baby the same age as Henry. They invited us to church and although they then moved to Leeds, we continued going to the church. The turning point came in 1993 when we both did the Alpha course.

Gareth: And you moved to Wilmslow because of work?

Richard: Yes I moved out of oil and into an insurance company. It was a difficult time as we'd just moved to Wilmslow and had four children o-6 and the job we'd moved here with wasn't working out. But I then got a job in banking in 2000 and still work in that sector.

Gareth: So they weren't easy years.

Anne: No but it was fine really, personally I have found the last few years far more challenging. Henry has had serious eye problems and there was a time a couple of years ago when I was sitting in the hospital waiting whilst Henry underwent eye surgery and over in St. Anne's my mum was



seriously ill and passed away shortly after. It was very hard, but my sister was sending me regular texts of Bible verses and I was listening to a lot of Christian worship music, which helped a great deal.

Gareth: Our theme for In touch this term is the resurrection, what does the resurrection mean to you?

Richard: For me the most important thing, the bedrock of my faith is that Jesus died for me; God so loved me that he was prepared to send his son to do that. I guess I'm less clear on why the resurrection is so important; Jesus' sacrifice is the powerful core of the faith I think.

Anne: Well for me the resurrection is vital because it means that I worship a living Lord. I have a personal living relationship with a living person and that means I know who I am trusting and I don't have to worry about the rest, he's alive and got it covered.

[We then had a half hour discussion on the resurrection which is hard to summarise on one page of A4!]

Gareth: Well maybe this could be the beginning of a conversation about the importance of the resurrection! Well, thanks Richard and Anne, it's been a joy to talk with you.

THE MESSAGE TRUST

The Message Trust is a Christian youth charity with over 20 years' experience of working with some of the hardest to reach young people tackling issues ranging from offending, antisocial behaviour, unemployment, to self-image issues. They work in schools, prisons, and tough neighbourhoods, using music, drama and mobile youth clubs on converted double decker buses (why not speak to Harry about his time on the bus), whilst proclaiming the gospel. The Message started in Manchester and has moved to regions across the UK and most recently to South Africa.

The HIGHER Tour will be the biggest mission to young people in the UK for a generation.



It started in Greater Manchester, and will visit other regions over the next 5 years, where creative teams will lead intensive missions in up to 50 high schools over a four-week period, presenting the Christian faith and inviting young people to attend large-scale outreach events to learn more. There, through live music, performances and preaching, they will be given a clear opportunity to respond to the good news of Jesus Christ. In Manchester the O2 Apollo was the venue for 5 such nights. Those young people who responded will be connected with one of the local church partners and a range of helpful discipleship resources.

The vision is that, in partnership with local churches and other youth agencies, 200,000 young people – 10% of the UK high school population – might become disciples of Christ over the next five years and if they are equipped and empowered to share the good news of the gospel with their friends, our nation could see the transformation of this generation.

Why 200,000?

It is thought that if 10% of a population holds an unshakable belief, their belief will be adopted by the majority of society.

Those young people who respond during the HIGHER Tour will be supported in their tentative steps in the Christian journey. This had meant:

- equipping local churches and the regions youth workers for the expectant influx of new believers.
- training and encouraging Christian young people ready to support peers.
- writing the 'AAA' discipleship resource to enable new believers to get started on their discipleship journey.
- printing a pocket sized Higher Bible for every new believer to enable them to grow in their faith.

The HIGHER Tour vision has been covered in prayer from its outset. In the run up to the HIGHER Tour Manchester a period of 40 days of prayer and fasting took place.

BOOK REVIEW


Lifted – Experiencing the Resurrection Life by Sam Allberry

I'd be the first to admit that I am not very good at talking to non-Christians about Jesus, but when I do get into these conversations I tend to ask them what they believe happened at Easter. This book, by Sam Allberry, turned that question back onto me, not so much as to what do I think happened, I believe in the resurrection and am convinced of the historicity of it, but more about how do I display that belief and do so every day not just at Easter.

Right at the beginning Sam Allberry challenges us by saying that the resurrection changes everything – it guarantees our forgiveness, empowers us to change, gives us a hope for the future and an urgent mission for the present. Those themes of assurance, transformation hope and mission are then unpacked over the rest of the book.

It is not a difficult academic book to read, the style is quite light and humorous at times. One of the things I particularly enjoyed about the book is the way that Sam Allberry writes as if he is having a conversation with you, the reader. Writing about our certain hope that comes from the resurrection

of Jesus he reminds us of Paul's letter to the Corinthians "If Christ had not been raised, our preaching is useless and so is your faith" (1 Corinthians 15:14). After a short discussion on this Sam goes on to write "But don't sit there feeling sorry for Paul. If Jesus Christ is



still dead you have some serious problems of your own."

I found this book a great encouragement in both the explaining of the message of the resurrection and it's application for us today. Sam tells us of a man in the United States who had the Nike Swoosh tattooed on his chest. When asked why, he replied that he wanted to be able to look down at it in the shower and to remind him at the start of each day to "Just do it". If we are transformed by the resurrection that seems a good way to start each day – but I don't think I will be getting the tattoo just yet.

BOOK REVIEW

Easter Uncut - Carl Laferton

When I was asked to write this book review, I started to worry. What if I didn't like it? Would I have to compromise my integrity as a literary critic? Thankfully, none of these concerns were relevant since it is a genuinely good book which I have no reservations in recommending to you.

The book aims to tell the story of Easter without jargon or assumed knowledge, making it both accessible to those who no Bible knowledge, whilst also being a fresh telling of the Easter story for those with extensive Bible knowledge. As someone whose Bible knowledge lies somewhere between those two extremes, I found that what was familiar was painted with new colour and what was new to me was...new. I learnt not just knowledge, but also understanding and appreciation of Jesus.

The book itself is a series of short chapters, each starting with a passage from John's Gospel followed by a concise and readable explanation of both the passage itself and the consequences for us. It is written with non-Christians in mind and works as a great introduction to Easter (and



Jesus more generally), but I expect it will be valuable for everyone to read. If you are preparing to celebrate Easter for the nth time, this book will help you bypass your familiarity and rediscover something of the surprise and excitement of celebrating Easter for the first time.

MHY SHOULD WE BELIEVE?

The disciples' behaviour is incredibly persuasive. They witnessed Jesus' death on the cross and gave up completely, thinking they were wrong about him being the Messiah.

They are then transformed by seeing him alive after the resurrection. They are tortured, persecuted and martyred for their faith in the living, risen Jesus.

Stephen, the first martyr, is killed under the watchful eye of Saul the persecutor - who in turn becomes convinced of the risen Jesus after his encounter with God on the road to Damascus.

We are in a better position than the disciples. We have all the evidence; we can see what happens and we have the testimony from all these sources. Saul - who would become Paul, the writer of much of the New Testament - is clear as to the importance of the resurrection: "And if Christ has not been raised, our preaching is useless and so is your faith." (1 Corinthians 15).

Paul is clear on the implications - if Jesus is not risen, Christianity is nothing. And yet, Paul is so convinced that he repeatedly puts his life on the line to spread the gospel message.

WHAT IS YOUR VERDICT? STILL DEAD? OR RAISED FROM THE DEAD?

Your verdict, based on this evidence, is of

huge significance.

If Jesus never rose from the dead, none of

this matters.

If Jesus was raised from the dead, this requires a response. Jesus said, "I am the resurrection and the life. He who believes in me will live, even though he dies; and whoever believes in me will never die. Do you believe this?"

THEOLOGY CORNER WHAT DOES THE RESURRECTION PROVE?

Soon after Saul is converted dramatically on the Damascus Road, Acts 9:22 says he "became increasingly more powerful and confounded the Jews who lived in Damascus by proving that Jesus was the Messiah".

Proving is a powerful word. In a court of law you have to prove a person's guilt "beyond all reasonable doubt". You accumulate evidence and on the basis of evidence you hope the jury will come to the correct verdict. If you have been part of a jury you may wonder sometimes if the evidence plays as strongly as it should (but that is a discussion for another time); here I want to set out not the evidence for the resurrection but what it is that the resurrection itself proves as Saul does in Damascus and as Christians have been doing ever since (if you want evidence for the resurrection itself go to Peter Walker's "The weekend that changed the world", or the article in the middle of this magazine).

The resurrection proves according to Saul that Jesus is the Messiah, the Christ; this is why we call him "our Lord Jesus Christ". The Messiah was the one promised to Israel by God, the Anointed one prophesied by Isaiah (see Isaiah 61:1 "the spirit of the Lord is upon me because he has anointed me to bring good news to the oppressed"). Jesus quotes this same scripture to describe himself (Luke 4:16); he goes onto say that contrary to popular belief this Messiah would suffer and be killed and on the third day be raised (see Matthew 16:21 and many other places). The resurrection proves he was speaking the truth.

He is God's anointed to bring good news to the whole world, and the resurrection proves he is who he said he was, and he did what he said he would do.


There are many places in which this truth is explained by Saul (who was renamed Paul), and the 4 gospels spell it out. If you want one summary of what his resurrection proves from Jesus himself, go to the words he uses on the night before he dies; at the Passover meal he takes the bread and says "Take eat, this is my body" and he takes the cup and says "Drink this all of you, this is my blood of the new covenant, which is poured out for many for the forgiveness of sins" (Matthew 26:27, 28).

He is telling his followers (and us) what his death means; he is telling us that his death will be a sacrifice for the sins of the whole world, the bread representing his body broken on the cross, his body, not the body of an animal, taking away the sin of the people, and his blood in the cup taking away God's judgement over all sin.

The resurrection proves that this has been done. It can never be repeated and it never needs to be repeated, it has been done, it is finished. It is good news for anyone who knows that they have sinned and fallen short of the glory of God, like Saul, like us, like the world. Hallelujah.
